Early Spring Flowering Bulbs

These bulbs will bloom in March for the Winchester area

Crocus - Tommies

Crocus tommasinianus

100 bulbs for \$ 24.00

Small purple flowers announce that spring is on the way in a most cheerful manner. These diminutive flowers are great for naturalizing in a lawn or a sunny woodland area. Naturalizes by offsets and self-seeding and will often form nice drifts of flowers when it is happy in a spot. Likes well drained soil. Blooms earlier than the Dutch crocuses.



Hyacinth – Blue/White mix

Hyacinthus sp.

25 bulbs for \$ 37.00

This is a blend of blue and white hyacinths. In early spring 8-10" tall fragrant blooms will perfume the air. Great for planting along a walk where the smell will greet each passerby. Bulbs can perennialize but the blooms will be looser as the years go by.



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Netted Iris

Iris reticulata 'Harmony'
100 bulbs \$ 30.00

This very-early blooming, diminutive blue iris is the perfect harbinger for spring. Great for planting in mass or small clusters dotted throughout the garden. Deer resistant.



Mid-Spring Flowering Bulbs

These bulbs will bloom sometime between late March through April

Windflower – Blue shades

Anemone blanda
100 bulbs for \$ 40.00

This is an assortment of blue shaded small daisy-like flowers which bloom in early spring. Typically growing 4-8" tall, they can form a nice little carpet of color. Soak tubers before planting and place 3-5" apart and, despite its name, protect them from winter winds. Will go dormant in the summer. Can be used in a container.



Guinea Hen Flower

Fritillaria meleagris
100 bulbs for \$ 38.00

Also called the checkered lily, these delicate bell-shaped flowers perch atop 15" tall stems checkered in dark colors of reddish-brown and purple. Deer do not browse on these mid-spring bloomers. Left alone, they will gradually naturalize in the shady garden.



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Red Crown Imperial

Fritillaria imperialis 'Rubra Maxima'
5 bulbs for \$ 45.00

A cluster of orange-red flowers peek out under a tuft of leaves. The flowers stand tall on a 3-4' high stem and make a statement at the back of the spring border. The slightly malodorous plant discourages deer and other rodents.



Daffodil – Carlton

Narcissus 'Carlton'
25 bulbs for \$ 33.00

This is an early blooming two-tone yellow-flowered daffodil. The large blooms perch atop 14" tall stems. It multiplies easily so is an investment for not only next spring, but for many springs to come. Deer and rodent resistant



Tulip – Maureen

Tulipa 'Maureen'
25 bulbs for \$ 33.00

This single late is an ivory white tulip. Tall (25") and featuring a goblet shaped flower, this is a classic tulip for any garden. It is one of the last tulips to bloom, generally late April in Winchester and is stunning with other spring flowers.



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Tulip – Menton

Tulipa ‘Menton’

25 bulbs for \$ 25.00

This single late tulip is a rich pink with a touch of salmon on the edges. It is a tall tulip, standing 23-25” high. Blooming late in the tulip season, we generally see it flower in Winchester in late April – just in time for the Apple Blossom Festival.



Late-Spring Flowering Bulbs

These bulbs will bloom sometime between early May and early June

Allium – Purple Sensation

Allium ‘Purple Sensation’

25 bulbs for \$ 25.00

This perennial features a 4” globe of purple flowers blooming on stalks over 2 feet tall. This late blooming bulb makes a great cut or dried flower. Looks good in clusters or as a mass planting. Deer resistant.



Spanish Bluebells

Hyacinthoides hispanica ‘Excelsior’

25 bulbs for \$ 21.00

These late blooming spikes of lavender-blue flowers are great for naturalizing under shade trees. Blooming in later spring, we have a nice showing of them under the sycamore in Kathie’s spring garden. Naturalizes well and will spread. Foliage will go dormant in the summer so it does well with late flowering summer perennials.
